Eighth-grader Luke Hickam has been volunteering for 8 years but more consistently since the pandemic in 2019. When the 14-year-old was about 6, he remembers joining his family and church group at Cape County Cowboy Church in Oak Ridge, Missouri, packing meals for "Feed My Starving Children."

In 4th grade, Luke built and donated a Legos war scene to the Perry County History Museum also in Missouri. "I loved history and building Legos, so I hoped kids would want to visit the museum if they had a display made for kids.

"When COVID happened I was homeschooled for the rest of my 5th-grade year and all of 6th grade, so we made volunteering part of our curriculum. I helped the elderly in our neighborhood with outside tasks, chores, and pet care. A friend and I picked up trash along our road and around the conservation area we

Luke also shares why he loves to volunteer, "I like helping people and getting to know new people; they all have interesting stories. Maybe one day I'll write a song!"

Luke's parents, Jeff and Taedra Hickam, encourage Luke to volunteer "because it gets him out of his comfort zone initially – then he ends up enjoying it, meeting great people, and learning from them while sharing his talents.

"Getting there is sometimes the most difficult part. That's often the case in most things worth doing, but when you do and look back, you're really glad you made the effort. We're fortunate as parents that Luke's willing to listen and we (....continued on page 4.)

(continuance from page 3) consider when present new opportunities. He's also discovering that in giving to others, you always get far more in return – we've met some wonderful people who've become lifelong friends thanks to volunteering.

Volunteer opportunities

Volunteer opportunities abound for students and adults alike. In fact, all West Grand High School graduates have to have at least 40 hours of community service to graduate. According to West Grand Superintendent Elizabeth Bauer, the school provides the seniors with a list of known opportunities. There is also information for all students provided through announcements, physical postings throughout the school, and in advisory/seminar classes.

The level of opportunity for community service lies with the entity or group offering or needing the service; however, more has been concentrated at the high school level.

Regarding community service, Bauer states, "In my opinion, serving others is one of the highest forms of leadership and empathy. Our goal is not only to prepare students for the workforce or higher education but also to be good members of society. Community service is a great way to connect with others."

There are also volunteer opportunities at local libraries, churches, or non-profits. Last Time 'Round Thrift Store is run solely by volunteers, and the local Rotary Club volunteers for events year around.

Emily Pedersen, Kremmling and Hot Sulphur **Springs** Library branch manager, explains, "We currently have multiple volunteers at the Kremmling Library. They shelve books, create displays, assist with program preparation, run craft and science programs, and help with other programs (contests, ice cream parties, after-school clubs, and Summer Reading Programs). We have a group of teen volunteers as well, called

T.A.G. (Teen Advisory Board), who

work with us to plan programs for teens. We could not do all we do at the library without their amazing dedication, skills, and service, and we are so appreciative of the time

they choose to spend with us!" Melisa Sherman, activities director at Cliffview has many ideas endless and include helping with a planned activity, visiting with wellbehaved pets, and entertainment such as playing musical instruments (Cliffview has a piano available), dancing, or putting on a show.

This time of the year, there are opportunities outdoors such as yard work, landscaping, and window washing.

According to Andy Radzavich, executive director of Middle Park Health Foundation, the volunteer program is just getting back off the ground after being shut down for COVID. In addition to companionship for Cliffview residents, he would like to see the same for MPH's extended care patients at the hospital.

Volunteers for both facilities are required to fill out an application and, per policy, will be required to provide the following Employee Health documentation prior to volunteering at MPH: influenza vaccine (flu season is from September 1 – March 31, so if they are just volunteering for the summer they wouldn't need to worry about this), COVID vaccine documentation or declination form, and a tuberculosis questionnaire.

Additionally, background checks and drug screens are required for volunteers who will be assisting patients of Middle Park Health.

Applications are available from Melisa at Cliffview Tuesday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and





The West Grand Track team continued their strong performances at the 42nd Demon Invite in Glenwood Springs Saturday. The weather seemed to change with each event with wind, clouds, sun, and calm all showing up.

The girls continued to show their strength in their relays scoring in all 6. Fourteen girls participated in those being mixed and matched, allowing 3 of them to have season bests. The throwers' 4x100 relay placed the highest with a 2nd that included Wendy Eller, Celia Guzman, Lily Butler, and Morgan Nelson. The 4x200 and 4x400 team had season bests placing 3rd and 4th – made up of Taylor Martinson, Brooke James, Lillian Hufford, and Sara Leahman. The medley relay was 4th and composed of Callie Freitag, Brooke, Taylor, and Sara while the 4x800 was 4th with Celia, Louisa Parmenter, Evelyn Amaya, and Gracie Hast.

Individually, Evelyn [5th], Gracie [6th], and Louisa [7th] placed in the

3200, and Olivia Stefanik was 3rd [7-11] in the pole vault. The team was 7th of 17 teams with 33 points.

The boys' team scored 48 – good for 6th with outstanding relay work also. The throwers' 4x100 relay blew away the 7-team field to win the coveted extra large pizza, a Demon tradition. Chris Wellington, Kai Edson, Lawson Landrus, and Jackson Steinle quickly made good use of their free lunch.

The 4x100 and 4x200 teams, both top 5 2A ranked, placed first in 45.03 and 1:34.25. Wyatt Shearer, Joe Probst, Brayden James, and Wyatt Howell continue to improve. Cooper Martinson joined Joe, Brayden, and Howell to place 3rd in the 4x400 in 3:44.

Joe placed 2nd in the 110HH [16.29], Wyatt Howell 2nd in the 100 [11.51], and Brayden 3rd in the 400 [53.62]. The Coal Ridge Meet Friday will be the toughest of the season with 25 teams, many 4A. It will be a real challenge for the Mustangs to score here.

Citizen scientists can make a difference in their communities

Science lab coats are not necessary for this citizen science project, but you may want a detective cap to protect you from the sun!

As director of library resources for Grand County Library District (GCLD), I purchase the resources for our patrons. One area that keeps me alert for new and noteworthy titles is anything pertaining to science and particularly Colorado water issues. Science is especially relevant this month as April celebrates both Earth Day and Citizen Science Month.

Last summer, GCLD, Grand County Water Information Network (GCWIN), and Upper Colorado Watershed Environment Team (UCWET), formally Upper Colorado River Watershed Group (UCRWG), collaborated to bring water quality and water bugs into fine focus for GCLD's children's programming.

Geoff Elliott, a founder of UCWET, gently planted a seed for another collaboration in February. "How about joining forces for an ongoing citizen science project in which all ages and scientific abilities could participate? The data collected and shared could have a great impact on future decisions about Grand County water sources that affect so many."

I was hesitant. Then Geoff

a university laboratory to learn more about our world. In fact, with some informal training, anyone can make research-grade observations that shed light on important natural processes."

That got my attention, hook, line, and sinker. After all, a character hero of mine, Sherlock Holmes, is a master of observation, deduction, and reasoning – all skills that are also important to science.

We organized a meeting. Geoff summed up the outcome: "This citizen science approach is perfect for watershed-scale studies. We can all choose one or more sites along our streams, visit, then revisit throughout the year to document conditions, fish, wildlife, and even bugs that live there or even pass through seasonally. The CitSci.org app makes data sharing easy while guiding more consistent observations. As a professional scientist myself, I appreciate the curiosity and enthusiasm of our local citizen scientists of all ages. I always learn something myself along the way."

Greg Newman, founder and director of CitSci.org and CitSci mobile app, showed our committee how amazing and easy his website is to use. There are about 1,200 citizen science projects utilizing this platform, including the Colorado Headwater explained, "You don't need a Ph.D. and BRAT survey, a pilot project near

Grand Lake. You can start adding data and observations to it today.

Greg shared, "My dream is a society where all people from all backgrounds are engaged in cocreating the places in which they live together with their fellow neighbors and community members by collecting and easily submitting data and observations as guiding evidence for effective decisions that lead to thriving communities and sustainable ecosystems."

The dream is attainable. Those who participate in the collaboration of the "Adopt a Waterway Citizen Science

Project," focused on St. Louis Creek, will be creating a database that can be used for reports, projects, policy making, and evidence-based decisions pertaining to our water sources. Even "novice" scientists like me can help protect our waters in meaningful ways.

15 Tips for Greener Living to Celebrate Earth Day on April 22

Earth Day is a great time to take a beat and find new ways to improve our daily lives by making sustainable choices. From the volume of waste we generate, the materials we toss into the recycling bin, the resources we use, and much more, improving our environmental choices adds up to positive change. WM of Colorado had done some research and gathered 15 Tips to share for honoring the Earth and becoming better stewards of the planet we call home.

Ground Yourself: Shed those shoes and wiggle your toes in the grass. Physical contact with the earth itself is said to ground a person's energy and is known as "earthing".

Smell the Roses: Studies have shown that quiet time enjoyed outdoors can lower stress, improve mental attention, and better one's mood.

Sow Seeds: Whether you plant a tree, cultivate a vegetable garden, or grow herbs in tiny pots on a windowsill, planting something green that must be watered and tended to is an active way to honor Mother Nature.

Feed the Birds: Making winged guests welcome in your neck of the woods can support pollination

and help control insects and weeds. (it can also invite unwelcomed visitors, so be sure to put up bird feeders at night or when away)

Recycle Right: The rules of recycling are fundamentally simple so don't overthink them. Put only clean cardboard, paper, metal cans, and plastic containers shaped like bottles, jugs, tubs, and jars into recycling bins. To learn more, visit wm.com/RecycleRight.

Keep Recycling Clean: Never put plastic bags or plastic packaging into recycling bins. Never bag-up recyclables. Keep food, liquids, trash, and organic material out of recycling bins. Clean recycling makes for successful community recycling programs.

Stash Totes in the Trunk: If you keep reusable tote bags handy, you're more likely to grab them when you head into the grocery store. Estimated benefits vary but the regular use of a single tote bag can annually replace the need for upwards of 500 plastic bags.

BYO Cup: Taking your own travel tumbler when you pick up morning coffee or investing in the refillable soft drink cup accepted at your favorite convenience store are proenvironment choices. If you pick up one beverage every business day this year, by opting not to use disposable

cups you will save 260 cups.

Forego Hard Copies: Visions of the paperless office have not yet been achieved considering the average office worker uses 10,000 sheets of copy paper a year. Being ever mindful to only print documents that are truly needed in hard copy form saves paper, which saves trees. If you have to print a document, make sure to recycle the paper.

Read Labels: Check out product labels to seek out goods made from recycled materials or that utilize sustainable packaging.

Frequent a Little Library: Books are historically not intended to be singleuse reads. Support a Little Library in your neighborhood or start one.

Donate Clothing: The EPA reports that Americans generate 16 million tons of textile waste each year, which equates to 6 percent of all municipal waste. Donate unwanted clothing and household linens and consider buying gently used items. Remember it takes 1,800 gallons of water to make one pair of jeans.

Reduce Single-Use Plastic Use: Invest in sustainable items that replace the need for single-use plastics. Reusable stretch covers for food containers, beeswax food wrap, bamboo utensils, and stainless-steel drink straws.




