

Congratulations to Kremmling's VFW essay winners

In December, Wendy Eller gave her winning speech and Luke Hickam read his winning essay at the Wreaths Across America ceremony held by the VFW Auxiliary at Kremmling Cemetery.

Wendy's speech won the Voice of Democracy Contest for high schoolers, and she was awarded a \$500 prize from the local VFW. Luke took first place in the Patriot's Pen Contest, held for middle schoolers, and received \$250.

According to the VFW Auxiliary newsletter, "Every year, nearly 25,000 students in grades 9-12 enter the VFW Voice of Democracy scholarship competition. The first-place National winner receives a scholarship for \$35,000 paid directly to their university, college, or vocational/technical school, while winners from each Department earn scholarships of between \$1,000-\$21,000. The theme changes each year, selected by the National Commanderin-Chief, and speeches last 3-5 minutes.

October 31. Local first-place winners then advance either to District levels and then Department, or directly to the Department level. From there, only 53 of the 50 states, plus Pacific Areas, Europe, and Unaffiliated.

Mustangs off to a strong start at Salida meet

On a sunny but windy day, the Mustangs had a great meet following their spring break in Salida last Saturday.

With a field of 20 teams, the girls scored 45 points – good for 6th place while the boys had 67 points, putting them in 5th. The athletes had 14 personal records (PRs) and 5 tracksters completed the 4 of 4 [enter 4 events, score in all 4]. That group was Sara Lechman, Taylor Martinson, Lillian Hufford, Wyatt Howell, and Joe Probst. with sophomore Joe Probst leading

The girls had 4 individuals score with Hufford 3rd in the pole vault [7-7], Martinson 4th in long jump [13-10], Lechman 7th in

the 400 [69.08], and Wendy Eller 4th in the 300 hurdles [57.24].

All five relays scored with the 4x200 winning in 2:00.84 [Lillian, Taylor, Sara, and Brooke James]. The 800 Medley was 2nd and the 4x100 3rd with Callie Freitag, Lillian, Taylor, and Sara. The 4X800 was 6th and the 4X400 8th with Celia Guzman, Louisa Parmenter, Evelyn Amaya, and Gracie Hast.

The boys had 6 individual placers the way by winning the 110 HH with a headwind time of 16.86 [3rd in state 2A] and 3rd in the 300 H [47.24]. Wyatt max preps 2A rankings and giving Howell was 3rd in the 100 [11.93],

Copper Martinson 5th in the 400, and Dean Ratcliff 7th in the 3200. All the boy throwers achieved PRs with freshman Blake Terryberry having an outstanding meet taking 5th in the shot [36-7] and 6th in the discus [101-8] while soph Jackson Steinle was 6th in the 300 H and 8th in the discus [100-2].

The relays had an outstanding start to the season winning the 4x100 and 4x400 while taking a very close 2nd in the 4x200 to stateleading Platte Canyon. All three teams had great early season times putting them in solid position in the them legitimate chances for school

Next up for the Mustangs is one of their closest meets this Saturday in Gypsum at the Eagle Valley invite. This will be a tougher meet with 15-20 teams, many 4A, but with unlimited entries allowing all team members to compete.

"A historical fiction book that tracks


the lineage of a racehorse. Such a surprise! A fantastic book that should be on everyone's reading list." (Janet)

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








Obituaries



Dr. John Martin Colburn

Kremmling native and long-time veterinarian, John Martin Colburn passed away on March 31, 2023.

He was born on June 13, 1940 in Denver, Colorado to Ruth Helen Colburn (née Martin) and Howard Dwight Colburn. His love of cattle, horses, and agriculture were forged early at ranches throughout Grand County that his family owned and leased.

He spent most of his childhood on the Martin family homestead outside of Kremmling with his older sister Pat and younger brother Jim. He also spent a considerable amount of his youth on the Black Ranch, now known as the Kemp Breeze State Wildlife Area.

In first grade, he began school at the Muddy Valley School, a one room schoolhouse, to which he commuted on horseback. In 1958, he graduated from the Kremmling Union High School.

Few people are blessed to be able to follow their passions. Yet, John was able to combine his love of agriculture and helping others when he pursued his veterinary degree at Colorado State University.

As an undergraduate, he majored in animal production and graduated in 1962 with a Bachelors of Science degree. In 1967, he earned his doctorate and graduated in the top of his class from the Veterinary Medical School.

While in college, he was very active. John participated in the AGR fraternity, livestock club, judging, and the rodeo club where he also served as president. Membership was bestowed to him by Alpha Zeta and TriBeta honor societies.

Most importantly during this time, he met his wife, Margaret "Peggy" Colburn, and they were married in 1961. Over the next nine years, they would have two daughters, Debbie and Kim.

After his graduation, John moved his family back to his hometown and began his veterinary practice. He continued his practice for 55 years and developed many deep relationships with his long-time friends and clients.

Many of these relationships extended to the National Western Stock Show where he worked as a veterinarian in the yards for over 20 years.

He also enjoyed the local fair and rodeo where he was a participant and volunteer over the course of his life-time. He served in various roles for the Middle Park Fair and Rodeo, culminating his service as president with the 75th celebration in 1991. The following year, he and his wife, Peggy, were recognized as Middle Park Fair & Rodeo citizens of the year. During the 100th celebration of the fair in 2016, he was honored as a Pioneer.

In 2021, he was honored by the West Grand School District as a distinguished alumnus and was inducted into the West Grand Hall of Fame.

John relished his role of mentor and role model when youth would join him on horseback to move cows, help him at the barn, join him in the arena, or help him in his vet practice. And anyone who stopped by the house at meal time was always invited to join the family to eat.

Throughout the years, he served as an advisor for the local FFA Chapter as a board member for many organizations including the West Grand School District, Mountain Parks Electric, and USDA. He belonged to the roping club, Middle Park Hereford Association, member of the Rodeo Cowboy Association

(now known as the PRCA), and was appointed to the Colorado State Racing Committee. He was a life member of the American Quarter Horse Association and the American Border Collie Association and was an active member of other organizations such as American Hereford and Maine Anjou Associations.

John is survived by his wife -Margaret "Peggy" Colburn; daughters Debbie Lewis and Kim (Bill) Cameron;
grandchildren - Sean (Alex) Cameron,
Meghan Cameron, Jake Cameron,
Scotty Cameron, and Trace Lewis;
brother-in-law – Ken Barnes; nephew
Kevin (Chris) Barnes; nieces - Blythe
(Mark) Darula and Cheryl Cottle; and
numerous great nephews and nieces.

He was preceded in death by his parents - Ruth and Howard Colburn; siblings - Patricia "Pat" Barnes and James "Jim" Colburn; and two infant sons.

Services will be held on Monday, April 10 at St. Peter's Church in Kremmling. A rosary will be held at 10:30 a.m. followed by a funeral mass at 11:00 a.m.

A luncheon, eulogy, and time to share stories will be held at the CSU Extension Hall at the Kremmling Fairgrounds at 12 noon.

Stu attended East High School in Salt Lake City, Utah, and graduated from Utah State University with a degree in Animal Husbandry. He served in the Army in Army Intelligence and was involved in classified missions involving Turkey.

Stu married Mary Rhoads in the mid-sixties, and they had 4 children together. Stu was quite the character; he liked to remove his teeth to entertain his grandchildren, usually while out to dinner. Stu had a million stories of life, and he loved to tease those around him. In the wintertime he taught skiing in Colorado at SilverCreek Resort in Granby, and at Winter Park Resort; in the summers Stu ran horses for a multitude of dude ranches. Stu drove The Lift bus in Winter Park, he was a truck driver, a rancher, and a rodeo cowboy, riding bulls and brones, and the last bull he rode was in Fraser, Colorado, on his 50th birthday.

He was a prolific writer of the cowboy life, publishing over 50 books, including his Horsin' Around series, short stories and magazine articles. Stu was a proud member of Alcoholics Anonymous, earning his 40-year sobriety chip in 2023.

After retiring from the ski and dude life, Stu spent his time traveling the United States, selling his books and visiting his children and grandchildren. He spent the winters in Quartzsite, Arizona, selling books at Reader's Oasis Books, home of the notorious Naked Bookseller.


